The Longest Jump

Narrated by Brian Utley (who was himself inducted into the Minnesota Aviation Hall of Fame in 2001), he has carried a parachute for 50 years (required in sailplane competition). Brian's presentation includes Power Point slides, photos, videos and spreadsheets.

Brian's presentation is as interesting as the jump itself, since he is a renowned contest pilot in sailplane competition in addition to setting many aviation records.

Paul Shaffer & the World's Most Dangerous Band

Retirees and guests attended this Saturday evening performance at the Ames Theater in Burnsville July 1. Paul Shaffer was David Letterman's band director for 33 years, and many in the audience recognized him. While the live music was very entertaining and toe tapping, it was very LOUD. True Rock and Roll fans loved it; others from an older era weren't as pleased. The seven-piece band had some performers from the Letterman show, including Felicia Collins and Will Lee. A guest singer, Valerie Simpson, not only sang but played piano.

Several songs were recognized from the Jackson Five, James Brown, Prince and the Blues Brothers, but I personally thought the words were lost in the volume. In fact, those with hearing aids were at an advantage because they could turn them off.

The cast did an excellent job portraying an arms dealer (American) with a Russian mistress (spy), newlyweds from England, a scientist from Germany, and a pacifist from France among others.

Idiots Delight was written by Robert Sherwood in 1939 when many were becoming increasingly concerned about fascism in Germany and Italy. What is interesting is how accurate the play was to actual events that took place a few years later. The play also looks at the toxic brew of populism, nationalism, and militarism that can lead a culture from a civil society to world war. We also see that current events in the US and Europe could be the repeating of history.

Do you have any specific questions about technology or something specific you would like to see covered in this column? Send your suggestions, questions, and comments to the club at ceridian.retirees@yahoo.com. We will try to address them in future issues.

This month I found something a little different for you. I know a lot of you use Facebook so I thought this might be of interest to you.

Here are some quick and easy ways to browse your chat history on Facebook.

Desktop: View All in Messenger

Viewing Facebook on your laptop is the easiest way to view your backlog of messages, but you must know how. When you click on one of your messages, you see a tiny window pop up at the bottom of the screen. It's narrow and confined, and it's not easy to read. When you press "enter," it immediately sends the message, whether you were finished writing it or not.

If you don't know what to look for, the commands are surprisingly difficult to spot. But when you click on the "message" icon, and a bunch of messages appear as a drop-down menu, all you have to do is go to the bottom of this list and you'll find "View All In Messenger."

This link will send you to a new page, where you'll see all your conversations, all your contacts, and every undeleted word you've ever written to anybody. When you scroll upward, older messages will magically appear.

From there, you can also use the search function on the right-hand side to find specific words or phrases, pinpointing a precise moment in the conversation.

Phone: Use Messenger App

If you use Facebook on your smartphone, you've almost certainly downloaded the messenger app. Facebook has made it nearly impossible to use the website without this supplementary app, and you've probably requested push notifications as well. The company isn't exactly subtle about wanting you to use all its features.

Conveniently, this app also stores all your correspondences. All you must do is scroll upward, and you'll see a complete archive of every note you've ever transmitted.

The Tax System Explained in Beer

Suppose that every day, ten men go out for beer and the bill for all ten comes to \$100. If they paid their bill the way we pay our taxes, it would go something like this:

The first four men (the poorest) would pay nothing.

The fifth would pay \$1.

The sixth would pay \$3.

The seventh would pay \$7.

The eighth would pay \$12.

The ninth would pay \$18.

The tenth man (the richest) would pay \$59.

So, that's what they decided to do.

The ten men drank in the bar every day and seemed quite happy with the arrangement, until one day, the owner threw them a curve ball. "Since you are all such good customers" he said, "I'm going to reduce the cost of your daily beer by \$20. Drinks for the ten men would now cost just \$80.

The group still wanted to pay their bill the way we pay our taxes, so the first four men were unaffected. They would still drink for free. But what about the other six men? How could they divide the \$20 windfall so that everyone would get his fair share? They realized that \$20 divided by six is \$3.33. But if they subtracted that from everybody's share, then the fifth man and the sixth man would each end up being paid to drink his beer. So, the bar owner suggested that it would be fair to reduce each man's bill by a higher percentage the poorer he was, to follow the principle of the tax system they had been using, and he proceeded to work out the amounts he suggested that each should now pay.

And so the fifth man, like the first four, now paid nothing (100% savings). The sixth now paid \$2 instead of \$3..(33% savings). The seventh now paid \$5 instead of \$7..(28% savings). The eighth now paid \$9 instead of \$12..(25% savings). The ninth now paid \$14 instead of \$18..(22% savings). The tenth now paid \$49 instead of \$59..(16% savings).

Each of the six was better off than before. And the first four continued to drink for free. But, once outside the bar, the men began to compare their savings.

"I only got a dollar out of the \$20 savings," declared the sixth man. He pointed to the tenth man, "but he got \$10!" "Yeah, that's right," exclaimed the fifth man. "I only saved a dollar too. It's unfair that he received ten times more benefit than me!" "That's true!" shouted the seventh man. "Why should he get \$10 back, when I got only \$2? The wealthy get all the breaks!"

"Wait a minute," yelled the first four men in unison, "We didn't get anything at all. This new tax system exploits the poor!"

The next night the tenth man didn't show up for drinks, so the nine sat down and had their beers without him. But when it came time to pay the bill, they discovered something important. They didn't have enough money between all of them for even half of the bill!

And that, boys and girls, journalists and government ministers, is how our tax system works. The people who already pay the highest taxes will naturally get the most benefit from a tax reduction. 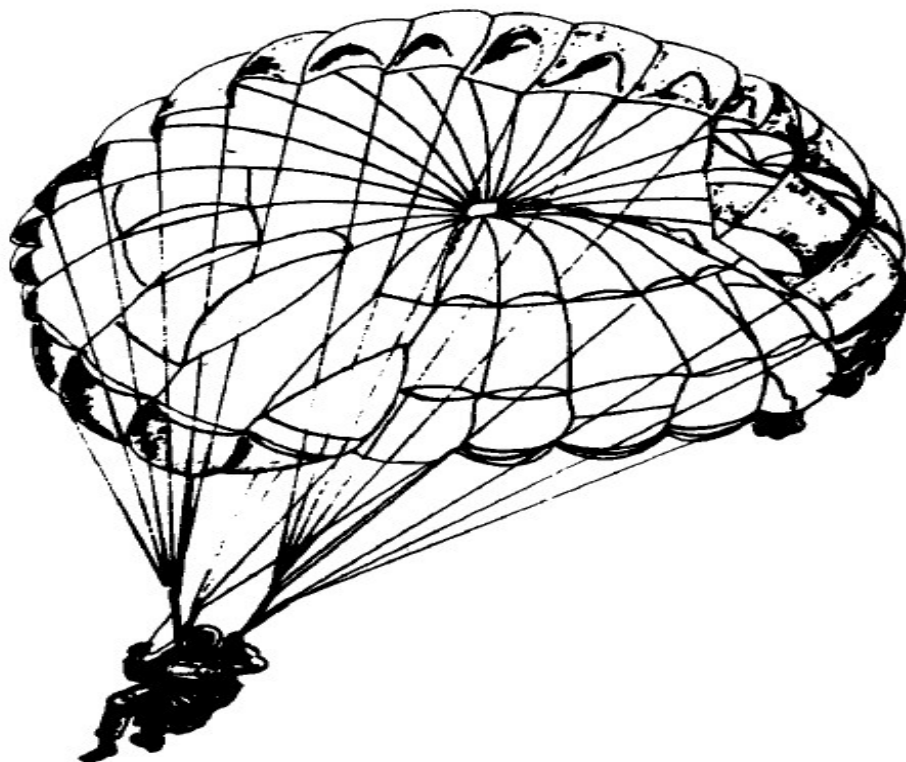
